Introduction and welcome from the wardens

Welcome to our parish profile. If you are looking for a move to a church, which is lively, welcoming and outward looking, then read on!

Christ Church Pennington has had a strong evangelical tradition right from its foundation in 1854. Throughout its history, the church has sought to engage with the local community, both within the parish and within the wider town and borough to be a witness to Christ's saving work in terms of personal salvation and social impact.

Our church life revolves around worship, outreach and pastoral care.

Our worship is a mixture of modern and traditional with our main service on a Sunday being very informal with worship led by a live band.

Other services tend to mainly use the Book of Common Prayer.

Outreach with the gospel is at the heart of what we do. Regular Church activities seek to witness to all ages from toddlers through to retirees. We have gained favour with the local authority, particularly for the work we do amongst teenagers and young people, to the point that the Borough Council provides funding for some of these activities. We recognise that our weakest area in outreach is engaging with families with young children. This is a particular area where we are looking to you for leadership.

Pastoral care comes under two main headings: care of Church members through small Life Groups and wider pastoral care through our Pastoral Care and Bereavement Support Teams. Even with these two strands of care, as we look at our church life, we, as wardens, realise that pastoral care may be an area where we need fresh guidance and leadership. Are you the person to give this?

All these activities support our overall vision to be a church that is Christ-centred and community-engaged, committed to making disciples throughout our local community. Hopefully, as you read this profile, you will be enthused about what God is doing and about what the future may hold.

May God bless you as you prayerfully consider this vacancy.

Who are we?

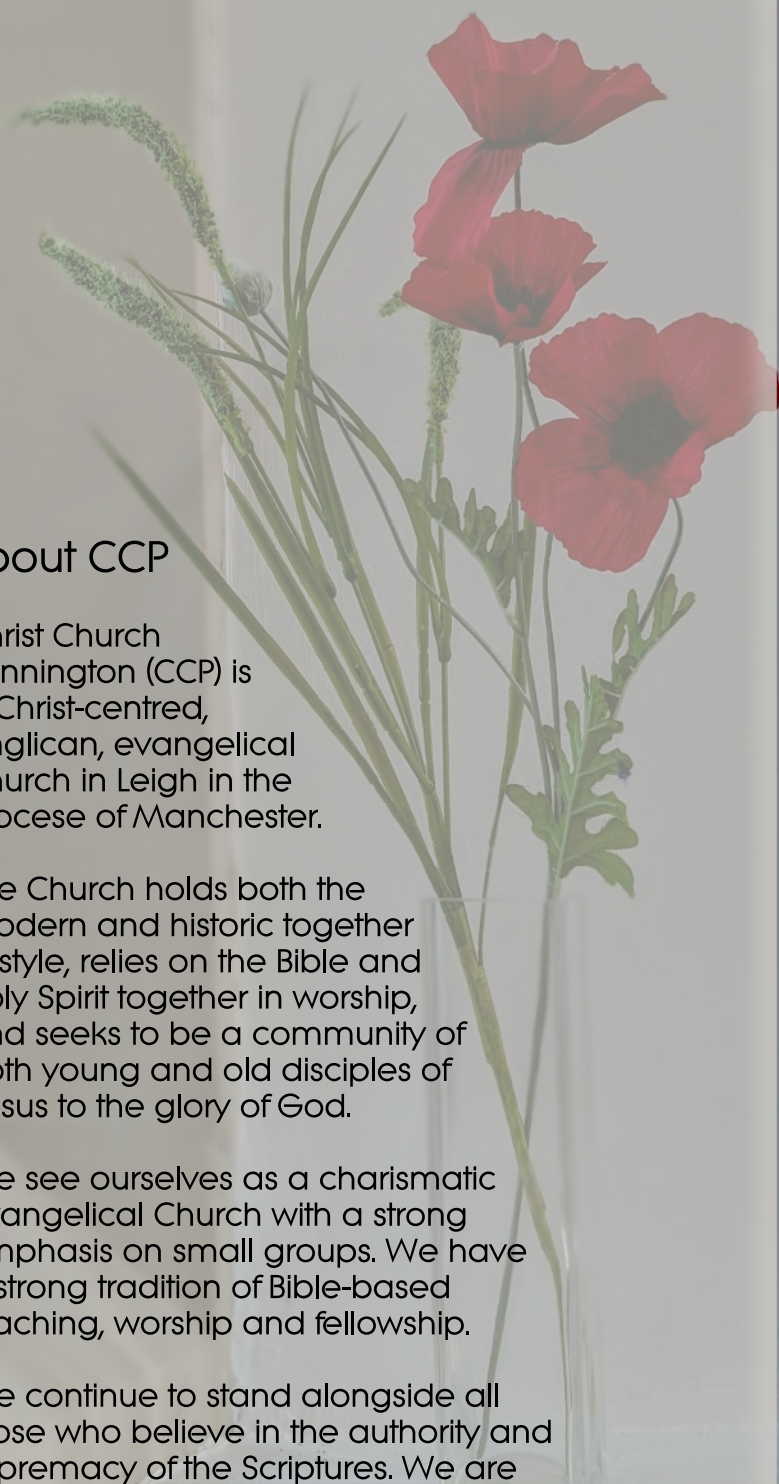
About CCP

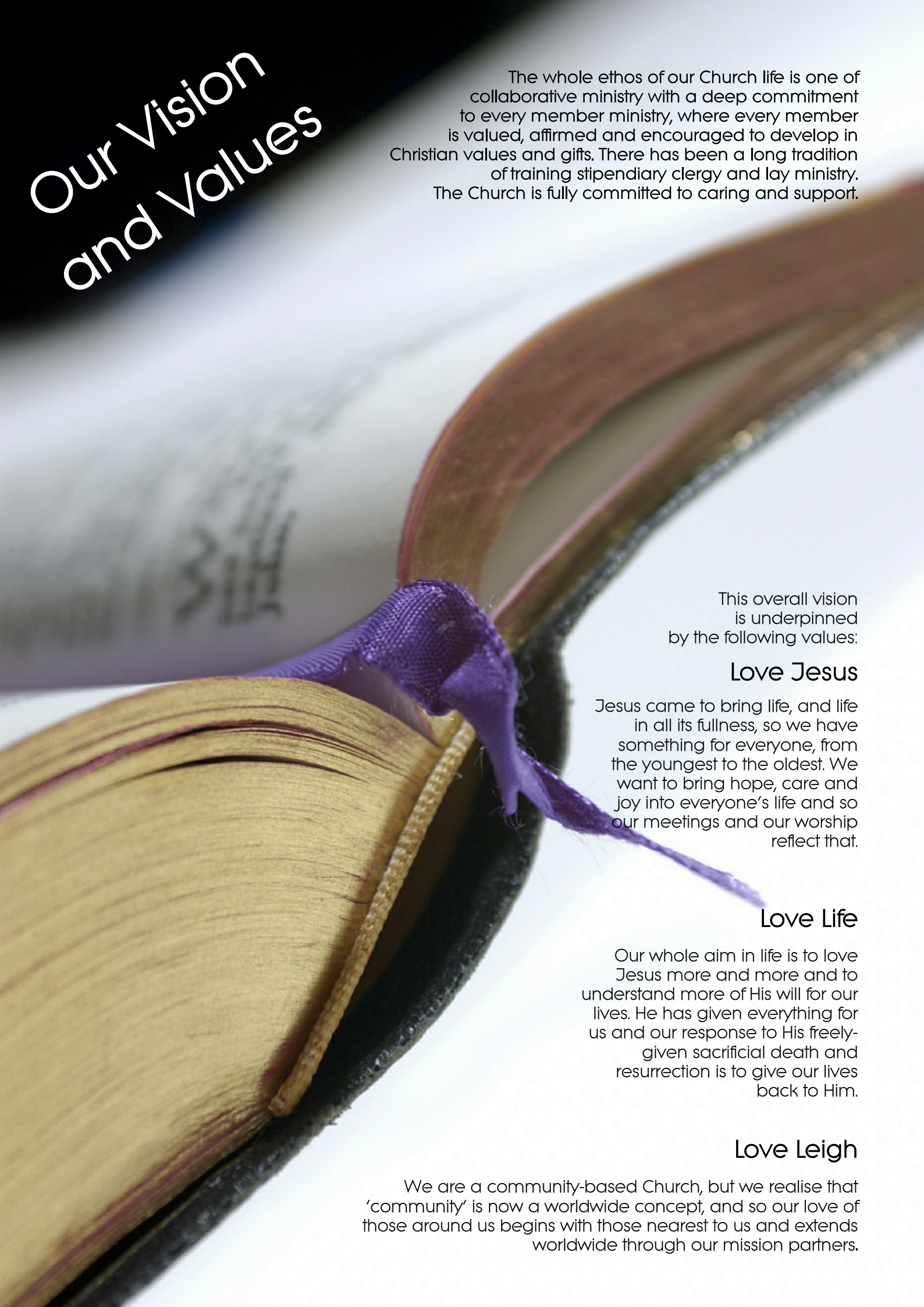
Christ Church Pennington (CCP) is a Christ-centred, Anglican, evangelical Church in Leigh in the Diocese of Manchester.

The Church holds both the modern and historic together in style, relies on the Bible and Holy Spirit together in worship, and seeks to be a community of both young and old disciples of Jesus to the glory of God.

We see ourselves as a charismatic evangelical Church with a strong emphasis on small groups. We have a strong tradition of Bible-based teaching, worship and fellowship.

We continue to stand alongside all those who believe in the authority and supremacy of the Scriptures. We are also open to the moving of God's Holy Spirit.





Our Vision and Values

The whole ethos of our Church life is one of collaborative ministry with a deep commitment to every member ministry, where every member is valued, affirmed and encouraged to develop in Christian values and gifts. There has been a long tradition of training stipendiary clergy and lay ministry. The Church is fully committed to caring and support.

Love Jesus

Jesus came to bring life, and life in all its fullness, so we have something for everyone, from the youngest to the oldest. We want to bring hope, care and joy into everyone's life and so our meetings and our worship reflect that.

Our Parish

Leigh is situated in the heart of the North West just off the East Lancashire Road, 40 minutes by car from Manchester and 45 minutes from Liverpool. The M6, M60 and M61 motorways are all less than 15 minutes away.

Leigh is a town which was built on cotton, coal and engineering, though all of these industries have ceased, leading to several parts of the town having higher scores than average on several measures of deprivation, including income deprivation, unemployment, poor health and education, and crime (source:uklocalarea.com). Pennington is a suburban area situated just south of Leigh town centre separated from the rest of the town by the Leeds-Liverpool-Bridgewater canal. The parish is quite varied socially with large Victorian houses along the main road, well established tree lined suburban roads dating from the 1930s with more modern additions, two working class council estates built in the 1940s and several recent housing developments including at the Sports Village site.

Leigh Sports Village, which has a hotel, pub, a 12,000 capacity Rugby League and Soccer stadium, athletics track, 25m swimming pool, sports halls and gym, sixth form college and Morrison's supermarket, is within the parish and about five minutes' walk from the church.

Pennington Hall Park, with children's play area, tennis courts, crown green bowling, band stand and café, is also within the parish.



Our congregations

CCP has 147 people on the electoral roll. 10:30am morning services currently average about 70 adults (see Appendix for details). Morning services, whether communion or morning praise, have modern worship songs and an informal atmosphere with multiple people participating from the front. Once a month, CCP has an all age service with a youth band, where young people are encouraged to participate and take leadership roles. Communion services at 8:00am average around 12-15 people, as do the more traditional services at 6:30pm. Although most of the congregation live in the parish, a significant proportion travels in from surrounding areas.

Sports Village Church (SVC) is a Fresh Expressions congregation founded in 2008. SVC meets in a room rented from the Leigh Harriers athletic club on a Sunday afternoon at 4:30pm. Meetings begin with a drink and biscuit and are followed by a time of sung worship, which is designed to be accessible to people who might be less comfortable with the more formal services at CCP. Music for worship is provided either by a band or from recordings. SVC is led by the Lead Pastor, John Bennett, assisted by a team of volunteers.





Our buildings and grounds

The church building (above) is a well maintained Grade-II listed building opened in 1854. It is situated on the main road through Pennington and is widely known throughout the community. It has seating for about 250 downstairs and a balcony, which is not usually used except for the technical team and for overflow from the main worship space, if needed. There is a current application for a faculty to repair the exterior stonework.

Within the Church grounds is the Church House Community Centre (right), the former vicarage. This is used for most youth and community activities. During the vacancy, CCP has done work to update this facility by building a disabled toilet and re-carpeting some of the downstairs areas.

The church grounds themselves are beautifully kept with a mixture of lawns, shrubs and mature trees. Within the grounds there is a memorial garden and space for off road parking.

The buildings and grounds are faithfully maintained by a team of volunteers led by the building manager, Russell Roberts.



The rear part of the Church, under the balcony, has been partitioned off to form a foyer which is used as a social area after services, sometimes for a creche during morning services and for midweek meetings.

The church building has a multi-purpose room off the foyer, used for preparing refreshments and holding small groups, plus adjacent Equality Act compliant toilets.



Bridgewater Café (please see page 18) is situated along the road back towards the town centre and is used for various activities including after-school drop-in sessions for years five to eight and a daytime hobbies and craft club.

We are currently talking to the owners about extending these premises to enable other activities such as counselling and other meetings.

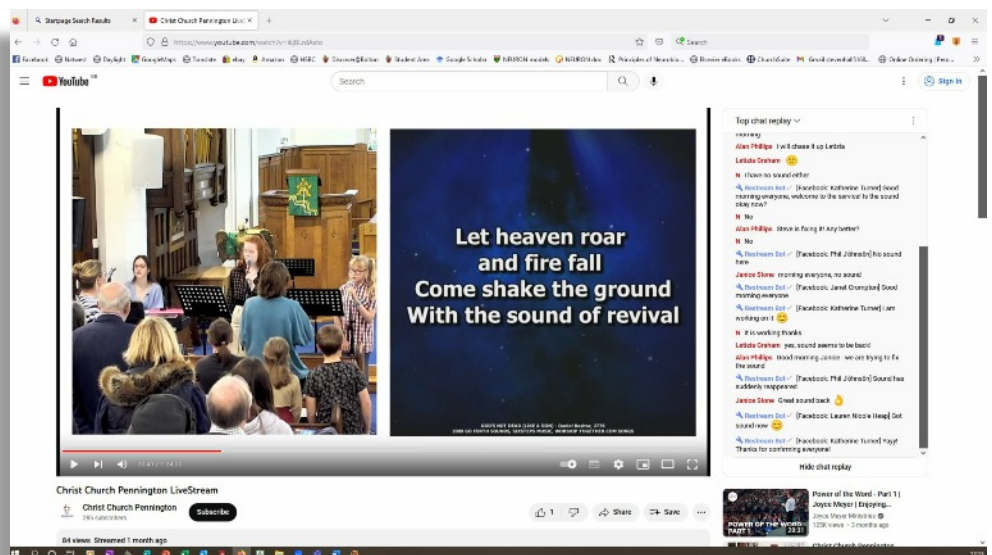
Our Sunday Services

The regular pattern of Sunday services has been disrupted, firstly, by the pandemic and, secondly, by the vacancy. Our current pattern is:

- 8:00am Second and fourth Sundays: BCP Holy Communion (before the pandemic, the first Sunday was Common Worship).
- 10:30am First Sunday: All Age Service.
- 10:30am Second, fourth and fifth Sundays: Common Worship, Morning Praise.
- 10:30am Third Sunday: Common Worship, Holy Communion.
- 4:30pm Refreshments and service at SVC.
- 6:30pm First Sunday: Alternates between BCP Holy Communion and Sung Evensong.
- 6:30pm Third Sunday: Prayer and Worship.

All services at 10:30am, and some other services during the year, are live streamed to YouTube (<https://www.youtube.com/c/ChristChurchPennington>) and to the church Facebook page, with over 50 connections during the service and afterwards each week.

We have Sunday groups for children during the 10:30am services at CCP except the all age service on the first Sunday of the month. Activities for children at SVC are provided by congregation members. Our numbers of children are low, so this is done on a week by week basis.





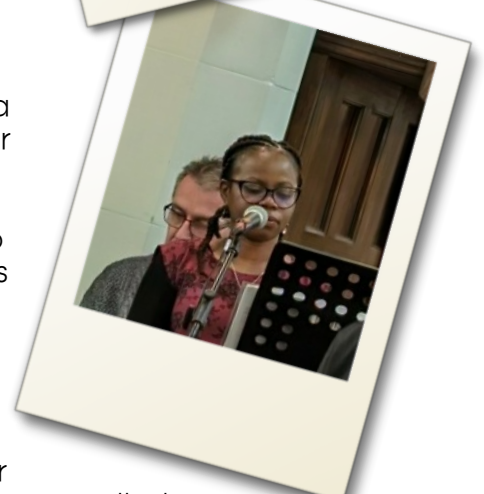
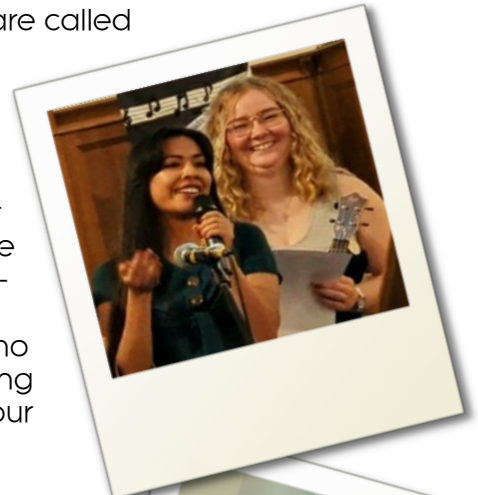
Occasional offices 2021/2022

In the previous 12 months to November 2022 there have been 33 baptisms, 24 funerals and interment of ashes, and just one wedding.

Worship, Prayer and Prayer Ministry

We have a good variety of worship to suit all visitors and members of our congregations. The 10:30am and SVC services are informal with modern worship led by one of our bands. 8:00am and 6:30pm services are more traditional. A traditional choir is led by a talented musician/organist. The choir are called upon to sing at Christmas, Easter, Harvest and some special occasions.

We believe that prayer is the foundation for everything that takes place in and outside the church. We have a Prayer Co-ordinator, who is an ALM for Prayer and Spirituality, and who is passionate about developing the practice of prayer within our church. Prayer and Worship evenings take place once a month and are a time to pray strategically for the work of the church. Twice a year we have a Week of Prayer, and also Prayer and Reflection days which take place in church. The congregation is encouraged to regularly prayer walk the streets of our parish. Prayer requests from the church family are distributed via social media and/or email. At our Sunday morning services, a team of people are available for prayer ministry, and we have a healing group that participates in occasional healing services.



Life Groups

Life Groups developed out of the cell group structure which began in 1999. There are currently eight groups, with a total membership of 60 people. These groups meet weekly for fellowship, care and mutual support, as well as worship, prayer and Bible study. They also encourage witness to friends and neighbours. Membership of these groups has diminished following the pandemic and a major goal is to increase both the number of groups and membership of existing groups.



Outreach and evangelism

A number of activities are aimed at connecting with people in the community so that we can share the gospel and encourage people into church.

These include the weekly Parents and Toddlers Group, Baby-interrupted Bible Study (BIBS), the weekly Holy Grounds Coffee Morning, the Hobby Hive Hobby and Craft Group, Men's Fellowship, periodic Men's and Women's Curry Nights, Taste and Testimony evenings and other occasional events, including Men's Breakfasts organised by Christian Vision for Men.

We are planning to hold an Alpha Course from the middle of January 2023 to the beginning of March.



MESSAGE

Young people and children

Over the last few years, we have developed an integrated strategy under the banner of Soul Leigh for reaching out to young people. This strategy includes using the Pais Team to run games clubs and Bible studies in three local high schools, giving them opportunities to engage with the young people. This work is supplemented by the Church and Pais Team together running sessions on a Thursday evening in the town centre shopping centre car park. These sessions involve The Message Bus which has computer games, karaoke, etc, a games tent and football matches on our giant inflatable soccer pitch, floodlit during the winter months. These sessions are conducted for about eight weeks in the autumn and summer terms and attract up to 60 plus young people. Each session ends with a gospel presentation given by one of the team members.



These sessions have a subsidiary purpose in reducing anti-social behaviour by young people in the town centre and, as such, are supported by Council Youth ASB Outreach Teams, the police and by Wigan MBC, who also provide funding.

We have established junior and senior Soul Groups for discipleship. Our passion and ethos is to equip and support young people to take the lead in reaching out to their peers, with the objective to release a movement of fired up young people who will transform our town. This group usually leads the all age service in church with contributions from other groups.

Soul Girls is a monthly nurture group for secondary and college age girls. We meet to socialise and to study the bible on topics such as friendship, prayer, love, plans and worship. Both the leaders and the girls take the sessions. We have fun, chat and share together with activities. We sometimes listen to worship music and pray too. We also have hot chocolate and cake!

The Pais Team have also been able to get alongside younger children in Christ Church Primary school, particularly in the Ethos Group, a children's Christian group within the school. Whiz Kids, for school years four to seven is an energetic group, always active whether inside or outside; with water slides in the summer and warm food in the winter. Whizz Kids meets on a Tuesday evening to play games, do crafts, play computer games and learn about Jesus.

Much of our young people's work relies on social media, particularly the Soul Leigh Instagram, supported by the Pais Team.





Pastoral care and local outreach

The Parish has a strong history of pastoral care and this is now overseen by an ALM. As well as visiting the housebound and those who are sick, whether at home or in hospital, the Pastoral Visiting Team offers pastoral support for many needs, such as loneliness, social isolation, challenging parenting and first time parenting. The team also provides advocacy for those who struggle to access state services and other agencies.

The Bereavement Team visit people who are grieving for a loved one, particularly following funerals in church. These visits take place in person to begin with, and this may be followed up with ongoing in person visits or by contact through the telephone.

The Welcome Team ensure there are welcomers both inside and outside the church prior to the service and also online. Refreshments are served at the end of the service to give an opportunity for people to talk after the service.

We have run a CAP Debt Centre for a number of years. The Centre Manager is employed by CCP and is aided by a number of volunteers. The team help people living in Leigh, Atherton and Tyldesley who are struggling with unmanageable debt. They act as local agents for the national charity, collating information for CAP Head Office, and providing emotional and practical support to clients. Through this home based service, they build links between CCP and clients, and this has led to several people becoming Christians over the years.

Running parallel to the Debt centre, as part of our social action at CCP, is the CAP Life Skills Programme, which is aimed at people who are on a low income, lacking in self-esteem or experiencing isolation. CCP employs a manager to run the service which includes running a course teaching budgeting skills and healthy food choices.



Our community connections

Christ Church C.E. Pennington school, which is located in the parish in the centre of a new housing development, is a Voluntary Aided Primary School associated with the Church. The PCC elects Foundation Governors of the school and has a say in the appointment of the Head and other teachers. CCP takes seriously our responsibility and commitment to our Primary School. School teachers and auxiliary staff are regular members of our Church.

Before the vacancy, the Vicar regularly attended to lead assemblies, and we have maintained these links during the interregnum. The Christian ethos of the school is excellent which enables a fruitful area of ministry to the local community. Several of the School's annual services and performances take place at CCP.

Our partnership with Lowton Church of England High School is already embedded and ripe for further close working with young people to build a bridge between Church and School. The Head Teacher (since September 2020) is Kieran Larkin, a member of our congregation here at CCP. The school is going from strength to strength both academically and in terms of its Christian mission.

Before the vacancy, as a governor at the school, the previous vicar has been able to support the Christian ethos which is providing students with opportunities to flourish and fulfil their God-given potential. The school Chaplain and other members of staff worship at CCP. While the previous vicar is a foundation Governor, there is no requirement for this to be the case for a future incumbent although the school would welcome continued close working.

The school works closely with our Pais team which supports and leads weekly activities in the school.

CCP is host to Scouts, Ranger Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, Brownies and Rainbow groups, which meet in the Church House Community Centre or in Church, and are often involved in Church activities such as all age services, Remembrance Day services and events such as the garden party held to celebrate the late Queen's Jubilee.

The Church House Community Centre is also used by a number of community groups, including the "Your Choice" mental health support group and Alanon, the support group for families affected by alcoholism.





Bridgewaters

The Bridgewaters Community Centre is located on St Helens Road about 300 metres from CCP and run by a dedicated team of volunteers. It is on a busy main road in a rather neglected row of shops and has limited parking. Its aim is to provide a centre for connection with the community.

At present it is used by:

- Pupils from the local primary schools: Years five and six use it as an after school drop in currently attracting about 15 students per week.
- Pupils from local high schools: Year seven and eight also use it as an after-school drop in currently attracting about ten students per week.
- A weekly craft and social club attracting about ten people per week.
- A local men's wellbeing support charity.

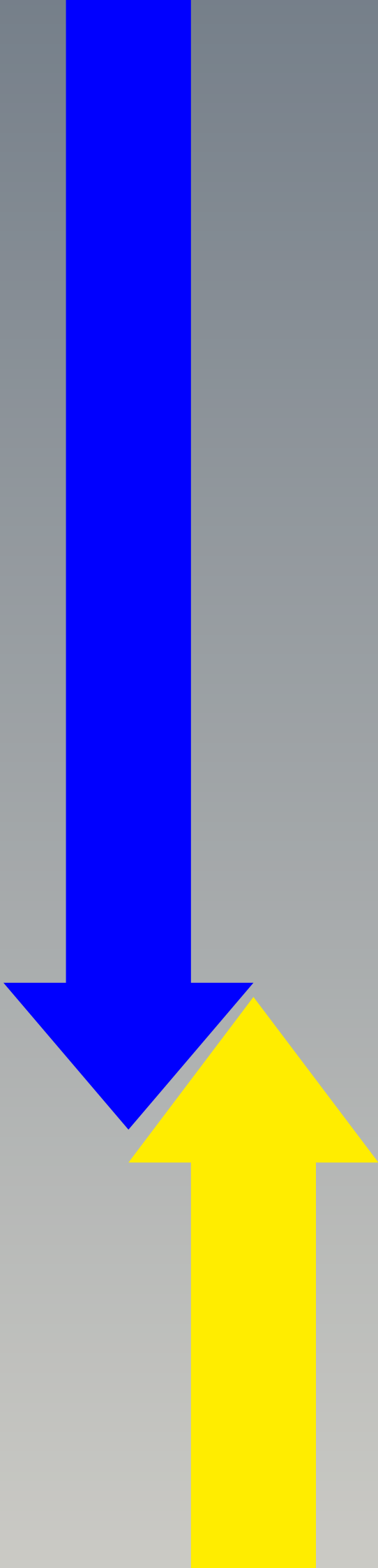
The aim of the centre is to provide a place that builds meaningful relationships which:

- Foster community spirit (between and within the Church and community).
- Enable individuals to flourish (through meeting needs or education).
- Facilitate the sharing of the good news of Jesus (in the centre or elsewhere).



Communications

At CCP and SVC we realise that communications within the Church and with the wider community are an important tool for mission. In addition to the weekly newsletter, which is available online and in hardcopy each week and the monthly *In Touch Magazine*, we are well represented on social media through the Church website, Facebook page, Instagram and the young people's Instagram account.



Our wider mission

Our wider mission

As part of a Diocesan wide initiative, CCP is a member of the Leigh Mission Community, a community of ten parishes including 13 worship centres based in and around Leigh. During the past year, these parishes have begun to develop a common missional life with the aspiration to grow ministry to children and youth and to reach carbon net-zero by 2030.

CCP supports Daylight, a charity that works across different denominations to provide counselling services to the people of Leigh and surrounding area. The charity receives referrals from GPs, nurses, and other community groups for a wide variety of mental health needs.

CCP has been a leading light in Hope for Leigh, which is an informal group of churches based in and around Leigh who are committed to working together for the benefit of the community. Before the pandemic, these churches met together regularly to share fellowship, worship and to pray for the town of Leigh and to organise outreach events in the town centre under the banner of Hope Out Loud.

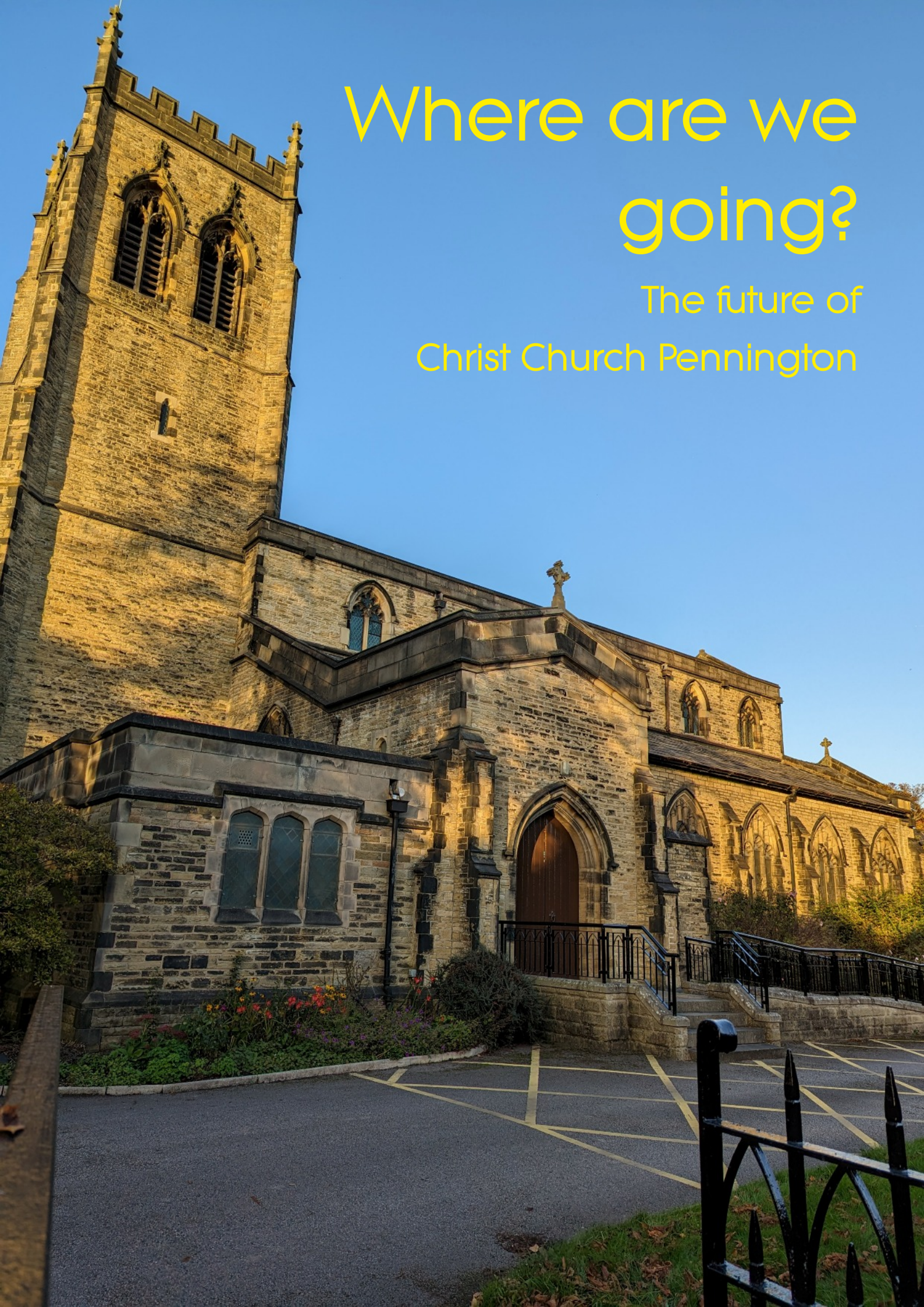
CCP also supports a number of missions both overseas and at home. We have had strong links with SAMS over many years. Church members have been sent out to work with YWAM near Geneva. All our mission organisations are supported prayerfully and financially. We welcome speakers to come and share their work and experiences that God has called them into.

Over the last few years, we have supported Pais and have welcomed Pais workers, who have stayed and worked with us for up to 12 months or longer. More information about the role of Pais can be found in the section on young people and children.

Eco Church

Since 2019 a small group of adults and young people have worked on the Eco Church award. We've received our bronze award and are getting nearer to a silver award with some challenges remaining! Our work has included improving wildlife provision, cycle repair sessions, an environment all age service, a CO2 audit, partnering with a local botanist and the Scouts and more.

The future of CCP ~ where are we going?

Our vision and prayer for the next five years

Our vision is for a truly all aged Church.

Over the last few years, despite the pandemic, our outreach has mainly concentrated on young people, particularly those in high school or those about to go to high school. The result is that the CCP congregation has a significant number of young people, particularly at the all age service and a large number of people over 50, many retired. Recently, particularly at a Prayer and Worship service, we feel that God has led us to pray for more families with children and middle-aged people to join the church.

This then, is the focus of our prayer with members being encouraged to prayer walk the parish and invite (or bring) people to events such as the Alpha course.

Our vision for Bridgewaters

Bridgewaters is a hub for social action and community care, with emphasis on:

- **Restoration** – a place for healing and flourishing with support groups to provide professional and informal counselling, mental health support, debt advice and recovery, emergency support and community projects.
- **Connections** – a welcome meeting place providing food and refreshments, a place to form and strengthen friendships for all ages. Groups including children's and youth groups, after-school. Meetings and activities for men and women.
- **Skills for life** – training and mentoring in life skills, money management, education and employment opportunities, homework clubs and healthy lifestyle choices.

The challenge ahead

Over the past few years, we have seen an increase in the numbers of young people associated with CCP. However, we have not seen a comparable increase in the numbers of people in other age groups. Many of the congregation are over 50 with many retirees. This has left the congregation with a "gap" in the middle. A serious challenge is to reach out to younger adults and families with children. This will be the focus of our outreach in the coming months and years.

Like many other churches, CCP was badly hit by the COVID pandemic in terms of attendance and giving. During the spring of 2022, we had a "season of return" which did lead to increased numbers, particularly at the 10:30am services, but attendance is still below pre-pandemic levels. The challenge is to encourage a greater return and also bringing in new people.

Lower attendance and the current economic situation have led to a reduction in income, which affects CCP's ability to move forward, and our ability to meet diocesan expectation regarding our parish share. Having said that, we have also benefitted from grants from Wigan MBC and others in support of our young people's programmes, in particular. The challenge is to sustain and increase our income. To this end, we are hoping to appoint a volunteer giving co-ordinator to explore ways of increasing our income.



Who might God bring?

We are trusting that God will bring a priest to join us as Vicar of Christ Church Pennington who will lead us on in our mission to grow the Kingdom of God in our community.

Our prayer is that God will bring someone who will:

- Grow to love this community as we love it.
- Be committed to bringing people to faith in Christ.
- Embrace a call to urban ministry and a desire to develop a pastoral heart for the people of the various communities in the Parish.
- Be strategic and visionary.
- Work in partnership with, and develop and empower the existing lay leadership.
- Work to encourage the ministry of every member of CCP and SVC.
- Be organized and promote good organization and communication.
- Have a heart to enable ministry to flourish among families, children and young people.
- Work together with local community groups and churches.
- Be open to the ministry and gifts of the Holy Spirit and encourage others to grow in confidence in doing likewise.

Job role and person specification

We expect the person God brings to develop their own ministry, according to the gifts and abilities God has given.

As Vicar of CCP you will:

- Be a spiritual and prayerful person who enables people to grow in faith and confidence.
- Offer leadership as the Church continues on its journey.
- Be someone who will get to know the Church, its people and the local community and with us develop vision and strategy for mission, inspiring us.
- Be willing to invest in the long term future of God's Church in this place.
- Develop and harness the enthusiasm of lay people who want to effectively reach out into the community and exercise the gifts God has given them to minister in the Church.
- Be an inspirational preacher who firmly believes in the authority of Scripture.
- Preferably be IT literate.

As Vicar of CCP we can offer you:

- A welcoming family, offering friendship, fellowship and prayer.
- A diverse group of gifted and talented people who will provide you with support.
- A hardworking and active group of people, willing to embrace change.
- Encouragement to take a day off per week, and your holidays!

Appendices

1. The Vicarage



The vicarage is a relatively modern four-bedroom family home. It was built in the 1960s and is well maintained. It has a separate study off the front hall, allowing the home to be separate from ministry. A downstairs WC is adjacent to the study.

The ground floor has a large family kitchen, dining room and lounge. Upstairs are three double bedrooms, one single, and a family bathroom. There is an integrated single garage, and gardens to two sides.



2. Finances

Our church finances comprise the General Fund and restricted funds for various church activities:

- Major works.
- CAP Debt and Life Skills.
- Youth work.
- SVC.
- Church House Community Centre.
- Bridgewaters Community Centre.
- Welcome, outreach and events.

These funds raise their own funding via their own dedicated steering group but can also ask the PCC for funding from the General Fund when necessary. The aim for the General Fund is to break even on a yearly basis and to hold reserves to cover three months expenses.

Until 2019, Parish Share, which is paid from the General Fund, was paid at levels agreed with the Diocese. Since 2020 with COVID closures and then recovery therefrom it has not been possible to meet the Diocese's request. The Diocese has been asked to share its calculation of the requested share and, once a fair method is agreed, the PCC will meet this request.

Throughout the COVID disruption the PCC has continued to meet its commitment to give 10% of its General Fund income to external mission causes. Church finances are managed by the finance team, made up of volunteers supported by the PCC Finance Group who meet six times a year. Monthly accounts are prepared and presented to the Finance Group. Annual budgets are prepared and presented to the Finance Group and from there acceptance is sought from the PCC.

3. Attendance

The results from the October attendance survey for 2022 are given below (2021 figures in brackets). These figures are for the 10:30am service at CCP and the 4:00pm Fresh Expressions service at SVC.

In addition to those attending church, on average, 14 households watch the live stream of the 10:30am service and around 35 people watch the service and/or the sermon on YouTube during the following week. Both the 8:00am BCP communion service and the 6:30pm services usually attract about 12 adults.

Once a month, there is a short service following **Holy Grounds Coffee Morning**. This is a Fresh Expressions service which had five adult attendees on Wednesday October 19th

Changes between 2021 and 2022 may reflect the fact that the vacancy started on 25th September.

The number of people attending services has gradually increased following the end of restrictions imposed because of the COVID-19 pandemic but, as of November 2022, has not attained pre-pandemic levels.
